The June meeting of the NJARC was held in Freehold on Friday the 13th. A large, enthusiastic crowd attended despite the conflict with the Mid-Atlantic Antique Radio Club's meet in Laurel and the bewitching time of the month.

Our Fall meet is set for Saturday, September 27th at the Freehold Armory. Timing seems favorable...three weeks after the AWA conference in Rochester and the only conflict at present being the E. Hartford Museum swapmeet in Connecticut. The indoor (rain or shine) drill floor is spacious, clean and well-ventilated and could easily support 75 vendors. Separate parking for vendors is available with very convenient access for unloading and loading through a truck bay. Bathrooms are clean and food will be provided by the armory in support of their renovation fund drive. And best of all is the remal fee - \$393 (\$258 for rental and \$135 for custodial fees). Tom Provost has titled our monthly technical session "A Restoration Potpourri"...short presentations of restoration tips from some of our members. The meeting will also feature accounts of the very successful NJARC/DVHRC joint picnic held in June, information on our upcoming meet on September 27th at the Freehold Armory and a book sale by John Dilks.

Marsha's request for input on historic sites in New Jersey that would be of interest to antique radio collectors brought responses from Jim Whartenby and Dave Sica. Jim discovered a Marconi Park and Radio Court off Easton Avenue as you travel out of New Brunswick. Marconi had a large facility in the area and it's nice to see that he has not been forgotten. Dave added the Menlo Park Edison site and a plaque at the Roselle train station commemorating the electrification of the area to our list; he will try to get some information regarding the possibility of a Tesla lab in Kahway.

A good response to our show-and-tell segment brought the following contributions:

- Jim Whartenby A GE aircraft type receiver from the late 30's plus dynamotor found at a Farleigh Dicken son flea market...all for \$3!
- Marty Friedman A 30's Silvertone farm radio obtained at auction for \$1. This set was driven by a 90V "B" and 1-1/2 V "A" battery and utilized a brass flag on the on-off switch to prevent inadvertently running down the batteries. Marty noted that the set utilized ferrite core slug tuners instead of standard variable capacitors which, as one member pointed out, prevented vibration from causing problems.

- Wendell Klinker A 1914 vintage homebrew crystal set obtain about 20 years ago from a radio shack cleanout. The owner (W2ZK), born in 1902 and part of the Byrd expedition who later worked at Fort Monmouth, built the set when he was a young teen. Wendell told us that the galena crystal was hacked off a small golfball size chunk that the owner wouldn't part with.
- Larry Gindoff Larry's skills were again exemplified in the mother of all keys - a giant (4X scale) adjustable and working key replica crafted from wood and brass. It was said to have been used many years ago by the Jolly Green Giant (HO! HO! HO!) to communicate with his brother who lived atop a distant beanstalk.
- Bob Allerton A 1-tube (UV-199) crystal detector radio. As an electrician, Bob found a box of new parts in one of his customer's attics with a construction diagram based on a Tri-Coil Reflex transformer. Apparently the owner never got around to building the radio (sounds familiar?) so Bob finished the job for him.
- Jerry Simkin A radio official badge from the 1939 World's Fair and an admittance badge.

The DVHRC-NJARC picnic on June 14 was a real success - a combined breakfastlunch-flea market-auction. The weather was excellent and the outdoor setting (the Elks Lodge at Clinton, NJ, represented Hunterdon County at its green best. The site is reminiscent of the pleasant park location used by the Niagara Frontier club for its annual midsummer meet. The lunch burgers, hot dogs, corn on the cob, potato salad, etc. - was simple but tasty in the al fresco setting. Ruth, a profesional caterer, donated three custom-decorated cakes to be raffled off for the clubs' benefit. Auction prep-n'-schlep was by Jim Whartenby for the club-donation gear and by DVHRC Oscillator editor, NJARC tube historian and generally nice, all-around guy Ludwell Sibley.
