Frank and Joe Hardy are sons of a celebrated leterive. Often the boys help him in his investigations. In their spare hours and during vacations they follow up clues "on their own hook." These activities lead them into many strange adventures and dangerous situations. Yet their efforts are usually successful in tracking down criminals. These stories are packed with action, adventure and mystery.

The Hardy Boys Mystery Stories is one of the best known of the boys book series. First published in May 1927 (copyrighted May 16) by New York publisher Grosset & Dunlap, the Hardy Boys have never gone out of print and they remain popular today with close to 500 titles published across several different series. This volume was the 24th book in the original series.


The Brighton Boys Series - Lt James Driscoll


Bert Wilson Books - J W Duffield


<u>The Uncle Wiggly Series</u> - Howard Garis



Uncle Wiggley's Radio or How the Bad Animals Listened In - 1924

Uncle Wiggily Longears is the main character of a series of children's stories by American author Howard R. Garis. He began writing the stories for the Newark News in 1910. Garis penned an Uncle Wiggily story every day (except Sundays) for more than 30 years, and published 79 books within his lifetime.


The Big Five Motorcycle Boys Series - Ralph Marlow


<u>The Aeroplane Boys Series</u> - Ashton Lamar
